Artist statement: In my artwork series, 'Colours of the Dragonfly' I focused on the dragonfly as my insect of choice, as to Japanese Native American cultures, the dragonfly represents wisdom, transformation, success, courage and happiness. I used analogous colour that blended together, which helps to highlight the dragonfly's ability to transform. In all of the artworks, I have used hatching but very close together so that it looks like it is shaded, I also added circles on the wings, to add more texture to the dragonfly. My use of brighter and warmer colours in the 1st, and 2nd artworks, helps to emphasize the happiness, courage and success that the dragonfly represents in Japanese culture. My use of cooler tones in the 3rd artwork helps features the wisdom the dragonfly represents in some cultures. I left the 4th artwork black and white, as the colours contrast against each other and the other artworks. The plain look also draws attention to the shading on the body and the circle patterns on the wings, helps to add more texture. The plain colouring lets the audience imagine that it is the end of the dragonfly's transformation, as black and white can mean the end in some cultures. I used a splatter technique in artworks 1 and 3, because it adds more detail to the artwork, and punctuates the colours used in the background of the artworks. I hope my artwork encourages the veiwer to see that my artworks represent more then just prints, but happiness, courage and transformation.

Artist statement: My curated series of resolved intaglio prints all had monochromatic color schemes, being green, yellow, and red, respectively. Each of the prints alone and together have a deep symbolism, and you can piece it together by remembering that spiders represent fear, and certain colours represent certain things, whether it be a negative or a positive representation. Green represents greed or envy, yellow represents sloth or cowardice, and red represents wrath or anger. Altogether, it soon becomes clear that the series of resolved intaglio prints are supposed to symbolise the fear of sin, or the fear of committing a sin. When I was doing the etching on my plastic plate, I used basic techniques like hatching, and I used simple techniques as well with my inking and watercoloring, with just two brushes, a provided roller, and a glass of water.


